Head Start Approach To School Readiness

The Head Start Approach to School Readiness means that **children are ready for school**, **families are ready to support their children's learning**, and **schools are ready for children**. Learn more about the approach:

- Physical, cognitive, social, and emotional development are all essential ingredients of school readiness.
- Head Start programs view school readiness as children possessing the skills, behavior, and knowledge necessary for success in school and for later learning.
- Programs must establish school readiness goals that are appropriate for the ages and development of enrolled children according to the following <u>Early Learning Outcomes (ELOF) Framework</u> domains:
 - Approaches to Learning
 - Social and Emotional Development
 - $_{\circ}$ Language and Literacy
 - o Cognition
 - o Perceptual, Motor, and Physical Development
- Implementing and measuring progress toward school readiness goals helps programs individualize for each child and ensure that children know and can do what is needed to be ready for kindergarten.
- Head Start programs are required to consult with parents in establishing school readiness goals and to respect parents as their children's primary nurturers, teachers, and advocates, as described in the <u>Parent, Family, and Community Engagement (PFCE)</u>
 Framework.
- As children transition to kindergarten, Head Start programs and schools should work together to promote school readiness and engage families.

Family Collaborations: These monthly activities help Head Start for Kent County parents advocate for and promote successful kindergarten transitions for their children.

Preschool Activities

Help the educators get to know your family. Ask questions and share hopes or concerns. Let the educators know the best way to contact you. Do you prefer to talk in person, or receive a note, phone call, text, or email?

Family Activities

Ask your child to make a drawing of your family for the early childhood educator.

Work together to make a checklist of steps in a daily routine. A checklist can help children get ready in the morning or go to bed at night.

Kindergarten Activities

Find out if friends or family are familiar with the school your child will go to next year. Ask if they know about programs or activities at the school that your family could attend.
